I'm Takin, a friend of Druk. I will show you what the Bhutanese people value.


Come on. let's go.




In Bhutan, it's customary to wear traditional clothing, 'Gho' and 'Kira' on a daily basis.

Forests provide us with the things we need to survive, and they absorb carbon dioxide, a major cause of global warmina. Carbon dioxide is released when burning oil or coal, right?

Currently, on earth, carbon dioxide emissions by humans are greater than carbon dioxide absorption by forests.

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However, Bhutan is one of the few countries where carbon dioxide emissions by humans are less than carbon dioxide absorption by + CO₂ Carbon dioxide emissions forests.

That's because the people of Bhutan have protected their abundant forests to ensure that carbon dioxide does not increase too much. Bhutan's constitution requires that at least 60% of the country be forested, but the actual forest coverage is over 70%.





Bhutan is a country that puts the happiness of its people and the environment first. This idea was introduced by His Majesty Jigme Singye Wangchuck, the Fourth King of Bhutan.
